MPs WARN AGAINST FAKE REGISTRATION

A high level team of Members of Parliament at the weekend led by the Deputy Speaker of Parliament, Hon. Chernor Bah, visited flood and mudslide victims at Kaningo and Mortorma communities to express their profound sympathy.



Dep. Speaker Addressing Flood Victims at Regent Community with Colleague MPs

At Kaningo in the Juba Hills community, MPs prayed for the deceased while donating 50 bags of rice and 80 bundles of water.

Presenting the items to the flood victims at Kaningo Primary School, the Deputy Speaker, with colleague MPs, acknowledged their suffering and praised the efforts of the community in helping the flood victims.

The MP for the area, Hon. Shekuba Amani Sannoh, appreciated the Leadership of Parliament and called on other partners to support the victims. The Minority Leader of Parliament Hon.

Dr. Bernadette Lahai, noting that the flood was a natural disaster, cautioned the public against parading nude pictures of victims on social media.

At Regent community, where the mudslide killed hundreds, MPs offered 100 bags of rice and a large consignment of drinking water to the community leaders. They strictly warned against fake registration of unaffected persons falsely seeking relief supplies for selfish purposes. They said if found wanting, such persons will be prosecuted by the law.

The MP for Regent, Hon. Pateh Bah, commended the efforts of the security sector and the resilience of the youths in the search process.
